- o Library management system: This system manages the cataloging, circulation, and inventory of books and other resources in the library. It can also provide online access to ebooks, journals, databases, and other digital materials. The Library MIS was the first in North Bengal to implement e catalogue and digital management system in the year 2012.

The Prasannadeb Women's College was established in the year 1950 with the mission of delivering the knowledge, skills and values towards nurturing attitudes and competencies among the graduated students. The vision of the college is to promote the students of urban and rural area for higher education and to improve the college into one of the best learning center. The college offers BA and BSc Honours and General degree Course for the students as with a total number of 18 departments. There are 11 departments in the Arts stream namely, B.A. (Bengali, English, Sanskrit, Hindi, Education, Geography, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology, Physical Education) and 7 departments in the Science stream B.Sc. (Botany, Economics, Chemistry, Computer Science, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology) Honours and General Courses. The college also offers certificate, diploma and advanced diploma courses (COP) in Computer Applications and TTM (Travel and Tourism Management). The college is affiliated to the University of North Bengal, does not design course or syllabus, some of our staff members are at Board of Studies (BOS) in Parent University. However, the University conducts workshops and meetings inviting teachers from the affiliated colleges to update, revise and design courses. The Head of the Department (H.O.D) and senior-most teachers, in case the H.O.D. is unavailable attend different workshops organized for the communicate, purpose, and exchange their opinions and suggestions for effective performance of the curricula. Educational and Geographical tour are arranged for the first-hand knowledge to students. Keeping in mind the changing social and global needs and employability of students the curricula are revised by the University of North Bengal. During the last five years CBCS system of education had been introduced from the academic session 2017-18, accordingly the entire curriculum of all the

18 subjects had been thoroughly revised in 2001, 2008, 2014 and 2015.

<p>We are going through a constantly evolving education era and an effective feedback system is essential to enhance the learning experience for students. This effective feedback system serves as a vital tool for teachers and institutions to gather valuable insights, further identifying areas of improvement and ensuring a student-centric approach. It is seen that by actively involving students in the process of education, their engagement and sense of ownership in their education increase. Therefore, a well-designed feedback system should enable a student to express their opinions, concerns and suggestions. This information helps to identify the possible gaps in the curriculum, teaching methods, assignment techniques etc., also can shed light in adapting teaching styles to suit the diverse needs of students from diverse backgrounds and abilities. Teachers and institution can also help a particular student via personalized learning, assisting student understanding her strengths and weaknesses and finally enabling her to focus on areas that require improvements. Last but not the least these above-mentioned methods help to foster a culture of trust, open communication and collaboration between students, teachers and administrators, fostering a positive learning environment. Hence, it will be not be an exaggeration to consider this feedback system as a fundamental pillar for continuous growth and development in the education sector. Feedbacks were collected from our outgoing final year students (Honours) about their views on our academics and library services as an annual affair. We ask them to fill a questionnaire in their Honours subject. Our main have been to evaluate our teaching environment, skills and other infrastructure. So, after collecting the data from students, we analyze what are they speaking about. It speaks about our strengths, highlights our weaknesses. It also gives us an idea about the performances (strengths and weaknesses) of an individual teacher. After all this, we set up informal meetings with individual teachers, Head of the Departments and take necessary actions to modify our teaching methods. But on curriculum, the mechanism for obtaining feedbacks is only in informal mode, i.e., mostly in classrooms or in teacher meetings. In annual parent/guardian's meetings, they provide their valuable feedbacks to the college and the college tries to keep pace with their suggestions and expectations.</p>
